The Belmont Murderer.

How the prisoner spends the few remaining days of his life.

The following is a portion of a letter written by Woods, the Belmont murderer, which comes to us from the *Malone Palladium* by way of the *Com. Advertiser*. We think

it should be read by everyone:

A VOICE FROM THE TOMB.

January 1st, 1878.

"What, a voice from the tomb! Why, thou hast not yet departed life, Woods, and how canst thou speak thus?"

Thou hast spoken well. My spirit has not yet shook the dust of this frail structure of mortality into the urn to repose until awakened by the angel's trumpet strain sounding from the portals of heaven. But come and see whether the present abode is an home or a tomb. Oh, ye wise mortals who think ye are on the straight way that leadeth to heaven, come and see the poor inebriates whom you send to destruction by poisonous liquors; come and hear them calling on all the powers of heaven and hell to destroy them, soul and body. Then you may depart in peace, if you will, and entering some place of worship, humbly kneel and say: "Lord, I love thee with my whole heart, and my neighbor as myself." Deluded wordling! Have you never read that he who causes his brother to fall shall be held responsible for it? Liquor dealers have caused thy brother to fall, and if so, then how low has he fallen. Judge ye; I shall not. Behold him who walks forth to-day, glorying in the title of lord of creation—tomorrow lying in the gutter, lord of nothing—not even himself.

Thou may'st consider this a singular production to emanate from the pen of such an unfortunate as I am. Do so; thou art welcome to make all the comments thou wilt. But reflect that some of the most touching as well as truthful pieces may be written in a dungeon, where sunlight rays never enter to dispel the gloom.

The prisoner Woods is a Catholic, and as such believes in penances and fasts. He now restricts himself to a single meal a day, and refuses to have on his iron bedstead more than a single blanket.

so that he sleeps with only that between himself and the iron slats. He sits up every night, engaged most of the time in writing. During the day he lies down for a few hours, but his sleep is always shorter than the average man requires. The walls of his cell are white-washed, and are covered with sketches handily done with a pencil, and with fragments of poetry from authors he has read prior to his imprisonment, or of his own composition.

The Progress of the Temperance Cause in Maine.

It is an address before the Maine Reform Temperance Convention, held a few days since, ex-Gov. Dingley took occasion to show from statistics the progress which has been made in that State during the forty-three years since the temperance movement was inaugurated upon the basis of total abstinence. Gov. Dingley has given attention to this subject because it has been announced in several journals outside of that State that there is more liquor drunk in Maine at the present time and more drunkenness than ever before in the history of the State.

In 1832 the Secretary of the Maine Temperance Association collected statistics showing the extent and effect of the liquor traffic. The population of Maine at that time was 450,000, and there were 2000 places where intoxicating liquors were openly sold as a beverage, with sales aggregating \$10,000,000 annually, or \$20 to each inhabitant. Last year the town agencies sold \$100,000 worth of liquor for medicinal and mechanical purposes. There are no places in the State where liquors are sold openly, and the friends of temperance estimate that the illegal and secret sale does not exceed \$500,000 a year, while the wildest enemies of the present law do not set the aggregate sales higher than \$1,000,000 or less than \$2 to each inhabitant. By this estimate the sale and use of intoxicating liquors are only one-tenth as much as forty years ago, and only one-eighth what they are in the average of the remainder of the Union.

TOWN MEETING.

The subject of temperance seems to be the all absorbing question of to-day with our townsmen, and a very appropriate topic it is for all to consider. When we Americans boasting of our superior intelligence, as we do, know that we are spending millions and millions of dollars annually for spirituous liquors, knowing that in so doing no good is derived therefrom, but fully realizing that the use thereof will ruin man, mentally, morally and physically, it is high time that something decisive should be done. We are proud to say that to-day Hermon Village stands second to no other village in this county upon the temperance question; and while we say this, there is far too much liquor drank here, if there is any at all drank; for it is the universal verdict of all, that the vending, or using of alcoholic drinks as a beverage, is a moral wrong, and is one of the greatest curses with which we, as a people, have to contend. This being a fact, are our legislature justified in passing a law legalizing the wrongful acts of any of our citizens? Are any of our citizens justified in doing that which they know to be injurious to their fellow men generally, simply because the law sanctions those wrongful acts? Can they conscientiously justify those wrongful acts by claiming that they have paid a premium for a license to injure and impoverish their neighbor? Let the dictates of an unoffending conscience answer.

A large number of our citizens who have recently been snatched from the jaws of destruction are now petitioning every citizen to aid them in this work of reformation, and asking all to aid them in

bringing peace, comfort and honor to themselves and their families, instead of poverty and disgrace. Can any man say to them, I am authorized to ruin you, and I will do it if I can make a dollar by so doing. People tell us that we ought to have licenses to sell liquors for as soon as you forbid the sale thereof you virtually tell men they shall not drink, and then human nature will out, and they will drink all the more. To such let us say; Do you suppose that if a friend should see a brother friend with a cup of deadly poison in his hand and he should dash it from his grasp and thereby save his life, that that friend would say, you have told me that I shall not drink of that fatal drug and consequently I will poison myself anyway. This would be just as reasonable as it would be for a man to say that because his friends had voted no licence that he would buy and drink all the more, for in either case it is the purest motives of friendship that promotes the action, and in either case ruin and destruction is certain to follow. We have a better opinion of any man than to believe that he will with any degree of sincerity advance such an argument.

Some urge as an argument in favor of license, that business will be improved thereby. This we do not believe; but admit that it is true, yet the few only are benefited while the many needy ones are injured.

We might say much that will have to go unsaid, but we trust that every voter will go to the ballot box next Tuesday without any selfish or pecuniary motives, and will cast a ballot in accordance with the dictates of their best reason and judgment, and we fear not for the result.

The New Clerk's Office.

The completion of the new County Clerk's office is a proper time to give to our readers a somewhat detailed description of the building. The want of a suitable place to keep the records and other public documents of the county has long been felt, and the movement for a new structure took a definite shape at the annual session of the Board of Supervisors, in November, 1876. A committee consisting of Messrs. Russell, Crapser and Dalzell, settled on a plan for the edifice in a subsequent report, which was adopted by the Board. The sum of \$15,000 was voted for the purpose, and the committee directed to accept such bids for the work as to them seemed most advantageous. The site selected was the corner of the court house and jail lot, and facing on Court and Judson streets. The building consists of an upright part and annex, the former 48 by 30 feet, and the latter 30 by 40 feet in area. The material is white limestone, trimmed with blue limestone, thus giving the building, as viewed from the street, a most pleasing appearance. The annex or record room is made fire proof, no wood having been used in any part of it. It is furnished with iron beams and brick arches, covered with concrete and Portland cement, over all of which is laid a copper roof. The main part is covered with a slate roof, with cornices of galvanized iron and copper gutters, with iron crest railing and flag staff. The foundation from grade to water table is laid with blue limestone, of which material the steps are also made, with a width of eight feet.

The record room is 37 by 30 feet in area, and its walls are lined with

hard finish. The flooring is of Vermont marble, supported by brick arches. The large windows are 4 by 9 feet in size, and consist of single panes of polished French plate glass, with smaller ones having single panes of the same material unpolished. The main part is divided into similar compartments, so that the same partitions would answer for both floors. Entering the building from Court street, the visitor is ushered into a hall 33 by 14 feet in area, and floored with Vermont marble. To his right is the Clerk's private office, a room 16 by 26 feet in area, with a ceiling 12 feet in height. To the left of the hall entrance door is the searcher's room, of same size and height as that of the Clerk. The visitor ascends to the second floor by a transverse stairway with oak walnut railing, and finds the offices of the same size as, and arranged over those below. The apartment over the searcher's room is to be fitted for the Surrogate's office, while the others are to be used for general work. The ceiling of the second floor is eleven feet in height. It may be added that the rooms are finished with black ash, the walls hard finished, and ceilings ornamented with centre pieces. Each room is also provided with a coal grate with marble mantle piece.

The contract for the building was awarded to Messrs. O. Moore and Thos. Fields, of this village, their bid of \$14,925 having been accepted by the committee as most advantageous. Work was commenced on the 17th of May last and has been diligently prosecuted until its completion. Some \$5000 will be required to furnish the rooms, making the total cost about \$15,600.—*Commercial Advertiser.*

It was feared, and talked by many that the effort on the part of our temperance people, at the last town meeting, was detrimental to the cause of reform, and that the labors for usefulness on the part of our temperance workers were fruitless. We are pleased to say that those who talked, or thought that such would be the result of their efforts are badly mistaken, for never was the reform movement in a more healthy, prosperous condition. Never did this work hold a more potent influence, or demand a greater respect, even from its opponents, than to-day.

But a short time has elapsed since many of our young men thought it became gentlemen to carry a bottle and treat their associates, while to-day a young man caught drinking from a bottle feels, or acts like Poor Dog Tray who got caught in bad company.

The reverse at the polls, on the part of the reformers, was not a disaster but rather a benefit. It stimulates them to action, and causes others to reflect. The entertainment last week was a profitable and enjoyable affair and shows clearly where the hearts of our people are.

A short time after town meeting some from neighboring towns thought that Hermon would be a good place to go for "a good time," but they soon found that our vendors of liquor were not actuated through pecuniary motives alone, but were men that were governed by principle, and that our people by voting for license did not vote for drunkenness.

Hard Times and Advertising.

Another error, and very common one among business men of limited experience, is that of economizing in the matter of advertising whenever "times are dull," profits small and prospects not over promising. This is the rock on which many business firms are shattered. A Murder in Colton.

Michal Dalton was found in the woods near Colton, dead, Friday, May 3d. His head had been split open with an ax. Robbery is supposed to have been the object of the terrible crime. Shortly afterwards a man by the name of Bristingham was arrested on suspicion. He had been seen in company with the murdered man, and on examination, blood was found on him in several places.

A Coroner's Jury was called Saturday A. M., they brought in a verdict that Michal Dalton was killed by an ax in the hands of Bristingham, who was held to await the action of the Grand Jury.

Fire in Minneapolis.

One of the greatest disasters to Minnesota and especially to Minneapolis occurred on Thursday night the 2d inst. that has for a long time befallen the state. At 7 o'clock in the evening the city was startled by an explosion that shook the buildings and crashed Windows. The explosion was discovered to have taken place in the Washburn Mill, the second largest flouring mill in the world. The mill was in flames in an instant and immediately after two more of the large mills were on fire and very soon six of the largest mills were doomed to destruction. Seventeen persons are known to have been killed and many wounded. Losses are estimated at \$1,500,000.—Sibley County Independent.

The Mississippi River Improvement.

The special committee on Mississippi levees has completed its report. It is to accompany a bill providing for the appointment of five commissioners, who are to determine the method by which the river shall be improved. The report bases the constitutionality of the proposed aid upon the fact that the river is a national highway whose improvement is the duty of the federal government, the construction of waste lands being made incidental to this improvement. The report draws attention to the fact that while the length of the navigable tributaries embraced in this scheme amounts to 14,886 miles, bordering eighteen states and territories, St. Louis, a place as nearly as possible at their center, ships 78 per cent of its freight by rail and but 22 by river. The amount of land to be reclaimed is stated to be equal to the area of New Jersey and all the New England states except Maine. It is primarily the duty of the states to protect these lands, but the federal government is bound to see that a great water-way works no damage.

The customs officials in this city, however, learned on yesterday that the article is retained on the steamer, the revenue officers refusing to pass it. The walkist is "kicking" and expresses a determination not to submit to the imposition.

Foreign News.

According to a dispatch from Ottawa the Canadian government has been notified by Great Britain that war between England and Russia is inevitable.

By an explosion of gas at the old Sidney mines in Nova Scotia six men, including the overseer, were killed outright, and many were injured. Three brothers named Sullivan were the first to enter the mine after the explosion, and they succeeded in rescuing thirteen men who had been overcome by the gas.

Count Schouvaloff arrived in London the other day, from St Petersburg. His mission was the subject of general discussion in that city and on the continent. In Berlin the semi-official *Provincial Correspondence* anticipates a favorable result from Count Schouvaloff's effort. It says that the latest declarations of the British ministers, as well as the news manifested at St Petersburg, are full of wishes and hopes for the renewed consolidation of European peace.

The exercises were opened with Music by the Band, and Prayer by Rev. J. B. McCullough, followed by the Reading of the Declaration by Mrs. A. L. Cole, and the Speech by Senator Jas. F. Pierce, of Brooklyn, Orator of the day. It was our intention to give a synopsis of the entire speech, but space will not permit; but we do wish to call attention to a portion that is of vital interest to all, viz: "The Hard Times." The Orator claimed that the Hard Times were virtually passed, that confidence was being restored throughout business circles, and that the early Spring we have had was prophetic of a bountiful harvest and better times in the autumn of 1878. We sincerely hope that this may be so.

After Music by the Anthem class, the procession again formed and marched to the Hermon House and dispersed.

The afternoon was occupied by

the Games, Races &c. At 4 o'clock General Pahzutahsapah with his Brigade, paraded the streets. This with the Band of Darkies with their Plantation Songs and Dances afforded ample amusement for the multitude.

The Fireworks in the evening were acknowledged by all to be equal to any similar display ever beheld, and at ten o'clock the people returned to their homes well satisfied that the 102d. anniversary of our National Independence had been kept in an appropriate manner.

A Submerged City in the
Lake of Geneva.

A strange discovery is reported from the lake of Geneva. A tourist having lost his trunk, two divers were employed to search for it. While they were below water they found what they supposed to be a village covered by the lake. Their statement led to an investigation of the spot by the municipal authorities, who took measures to ascertain the truth of the extraordinary account of the divers. On covering the placid surface with oil, these latter were able to distinguish the plan of a town, streets, squares, detached houses marking the bed of the lake. The ruddy hue which characterized them led the observers to suppose that the buildings had been covered with the famous vermilion cement which was used by the Celts, Cimbric and the early Gauls. There are about two hundred houses arranged over an oblong surface, near the middle of which is a space more open, supposed to have been used for public assemblages. At the eastern extremity lies a large, square tower, which was taken for a rock. A superficial investigation seems to indicate that the construction of the buildings date from some centuries before the christian era. The council of Vaud has decided to have the site of dwellings enclosed by a jetty stretching from the land, and to drain off the water, so as to bring to light what promises to be one of the most interesting discoveries of our day.—*London Telegraph.*

MISCELLANY

HOODLUMS.

Paris and London abound with criminals of every stamp, while New York, Chicago and other American cities are similarly afflicted, but San Francisco enjoys a monopoly of the species known as Hoodlums. These embryo criminals are a California production, and do not exactly correspond with and grade of villains in other parts of the world, unless it be the "Larrikins," who once existed in Australia, or the "Short" who flourished in New York twenty years ago. The growth of hoodlumism in this city has been rank and rapid. The origin of the word hoodlum, which has now passed into current use, is somewhat obscure, and although several theories as to the source of the term are afloat, nothing authentic can be ascertained concerning it. The signification of the word, however, is well understood. The hoodlum element first made its appearance in San Francisco in 1862, and forming itself into bands composed principally of half grown boys, has existed and thrived from that day to this, a disgrace to the city and a nuisance to her inhabitants. Since the close of the civil war and the completion of the transcontinental railroad, the ranks of the hoodlum brotherhood have been largely increased by arrivals from the Eastern States and foreign countries, until now there are upwards of a score of organized gangs, comprising some 500 members, in operation in this city. The members of these gangs are not all criminals, but the leaders are, as a rule, while in the ranks are to be found members more or less possessed of some notoriety, and who have regular criminal records.

PROTECTION.

Three times, in as many years, our village has been visited by a terrible, sweeping fire, and it appears to us, in view of the late fire that destroyed the west side of Church street, that it was about time that our citizens had some means of protecting themselves against a repetition of a like destroying visit. An organization should be formed and thoroughly drilled, so that each man would know his place and duty, and armed with some proper implement to fight fire, they would be of incalculable value in saving property, and perhaps life.

Our attention has lately been called to a very effective fire extinguisher, known as the "Steiner Fire Extinguisher." This machine was exhibited in operation in our streets last Monday. A large pile of barrels and straw, on which was thrown three gallons of Kerosene, was set on fire and in less than two minutes after the machine had commenced to play upon it there was not a flame to be seen. In fact, its operation was perfectly satisfactory. We know of no machine that would be better for this village, ten or twelve could be purchased, a company formed and drilled, and we would have a very effective force of firemen. The portability of the machine, its surety of extinguishing the fiercest fire, are its chief recommendations. We are glad to learn that the officers of the corporation intend to take action on the subject at their next meeting, and we believe that the next time we are awakened by the cry of "Fire," we shall have some means of protecting our property.

The New Orleans *Picayune* has the following: Among contributions for the relief of sufferers received was one which deserves more than mere record. It was the gift of \$1,000 from Baron Emile d'Erlanger, the eminent and wealthy banker of Paris, prompted no doubt by his worthy and generous wife, who was the eldest daughter of the late Senator John Slidell. We are informed that the generous gift was sent by telegraphic cable transfer at the Baron's own cost. He felt that help was needed at once, and he would not wait for the slow process of transmission by mail. It is a process familiar to bankers, yet it is none the less one of the wonders of modern science that a Parisian gentleman can practically transfer a magnificent present of a thousand dollars to the suffering victims of a plague in a city four thousand miles off in a single hour.

A slight abatement of the violence of the yellow fever is again reported, but its ravages, its death list, and the great consequent suffering are yet terrible.

The barge Mingo, in tow of the steamer John A. Porter, that introduced the yellow fever into Gallipolis, Ohio, has been burned, by order of physicians.

Alarming accounts are given by refugees of the sudden breaking out of the yellow fever at Louisville, Ky. It is denied that the reports are well founded.

MEMPHIS, Oct 8—Deaths, 33. The fever has broken out at Raleigh, Tenn. An appeal is made from Decatur, Ala., for aid. There were 67 new cases.

MISCELLANY.

An excursion train, consisting of twenty cars and two locomotives, was returning from a regatta on Silver lake, Mass., and when about seven miles from Boston, the engines jumped the track, carrying with them five cars, all of which were completely wrecked. The accident occurred at the Wollaston gravel pits, where there is a sloping embankment of some twenty feet. We read once in a while of a wonderful piece of cabinet work or mosaic work, containing ten, twenty or fifty thousand pieces, the maker of which has spent months or even years in producing it, and people go to see it as a great curiosity, but the most elaborate and carefully fitted piece of work or this kind ever made does not compare with that which the printer does every day. The man who does the first is looked upon as an artist—a marvel of skill, and if a hundred of his pieces are put in wrong side up, or turned the wrong way,

Miscellany

Lost in the Storm.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 24.—The recent severe storm of wind and rain blew down chimneys, fences, and awnings, and unroofed houses, in various parts of the city. While the damage in most cases did not exceed a few hundred dollars, the aggregate will probably amount to \$15,000 or \$20,000. Arrivals from down the bay this morning are bringing a few particulars of disasters on the Chesapeake. The steamer, Express, Capt. Barker, which left this port on Tuesday afternoon for Washington, foundered Tuesday night near North Point, St. Mary's County, a short distance above the mouth of the Potomac. Capt. Barker was rescued from the fragments of a boat by a pungy and taken to Crisfield, and arrived here this morning on the steamer Maggie. Capt. Barker gave the following account of the disaster: The Express left Baltimore at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, with freight and passengers for Washington and other points on the Potomac River. About midnight the wind freshened and continued to increase in violence until 2 o'clock, when it blew a heavy gale, veering from east to south-east. The steamer labored heavily and the waves broke clear over her upper deck. About 4:30 o'clock her joiner-work began to give way, and efforts were made to head her for the shore. Soon after 5 o'clock there came a terrific crash, the joiner-work had started from the stanchions. The passengers and crew had hardly time to realize what had occurred before a wave tore the saloon deck, like so much paper-work, and the following billow swept it off to sea, and with it, all on board.

He adds his thanks to the Councils and the citizens of Philadelphia for the honor done him.

Shooting at King Alfonso.

As the king of Spain was driving through a street in Madrid known as the Calle Mayor, on the evening of the 25th inst., a man in a blouse fired a pistol at him. The King was not touched and continued on his way to the palace amid the acclamations of the crowd.

The would-be assassin is named Juan Moncase, aged 23, by trade a cooper, and a native of Tarragona. He says he is a member of the International Society, and that his crime was premeditated. He arrived at Madrid Oct. 20. His bullet struck nobody. Moncase was rescued with difficulty from some women who wished to lynch him.

A Disaster at Sea.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—The Hamburg-American Line steamer Pommerania, Capt. Schwensen, which sailed from New York on the 14th of November for Hamburg, and arrived at Plymouth at midnight on the 24th inst., came in collision last night about midnight, during a fog, about eight miles south-west of Folkestone, with a vessel reported to be the Welsh bark Noel Eilian, of Carnarvon, from Rotterdam for Cardiff, in ballast. The Pommerania at the time was on her way from Plymouth to Hamburg. The steam-ship foundered in about 10 minutes. One hundred and two of her passengers and crew were saved by the iron screw steamer, Glengarry, of Middleborough, and landed at Dover. Fifty-eight are believed to be lost, including Capt. Schwensen, Second Officer Fokkes, and Third Officer Zarnow.

HEROIC BOY. How Young Clymer Gave Up His Life on the Pomerania.

Almost every story of shipwreck is characterized by the display of true heroism on the part of some one of its victims. And this last terrible disaster in the British channel is no exception to the rule. Young Clymer, the son of Mrs. W. B. Clymer of Philadelphia, soon after the crash made by the bow of the bark against the side of the Pomerania, found his sisters, Miss Mary Clymer and Rose, on the deck of the steamship, whither they had hurried from their state-room. He placed his oldest sister in a life-boat, and Rose was thrown in by a sailor. The boat was full, and the coward-sailors were endeavoring to get in it. Clymer thought his mother and remaining sister were in a boat. He did not hesitate. To save his sisters he cut the ropes which held the life-boat to the steamship and turned it adrift, standing himself on the deck of the doomed vessel. He said good bye to his sisters, realizing that he would never see them again. The fact that he placed the young girls of his family in safety before thinking of himself is not so remarkable as the nerve and courage, the quick presence of mind and ready grasp of the situation shown by this young man of twenty years.

It was the noble choice made by Clymer to give up his own young life, full of hope and promise, rather than risk the lives of his sisters by an effort to save himself, that marks his conduct as heroic.—N. Y. Sun.

Novel Motive for a Crime.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 13.—William H. Logan, a clerk in the Post Office at West Monterey, Clarion County, Penn., was arrested and brought to Pittsburg this afternoon by special agent Camp. Logan is charged with stealing and destroying letters for the purpose of preventing the appointment of a man name Hogan as Postmaster. He was held in \$1,000 bail for a hearing before United States Commissioner McCandless.

A Terrible Death.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 13.—A horrible accident occurred at the American Iron Works this morning, by which Patrick Shannon, the assistant millwright, was instantly killed and his body torn to shreds. Shannon had gone up on the platform to examine a line of shatting when his clothing was caught by a pulley and his body drawn on to the shaft, which was making 240 revolutions a minute. Before the machinery could be stopped his body was torn to pieces and scattered over the mill, portions of the remains being thrown 300 feet distant.
