

Notes on Trout Lake History

P 3. Jack Graham owns McMillan cottage, lot 1-B.

P 3. Elsie Evans - about 1930-40

14. Trout Assn now defunct. Active about 1955-65.

P 4-5. T.S.B. Island - once called Jordan I.

The Lansing estate, Watertown, (Woodrow Wilson's Sec'y of State) once claimed ownership of all islands in the lake. However Carpenter Isle, Beth Isle & Jordan (or Brown-Graham Isle) had been sold. I had to get personal permission from Emma Lansing to put a light pole on end of her little "Ship Island" between mainland & my place (1939).

Incidentally the installation of electricity in 1939 was an "event". They had a big torchlight parade (on water) to celebrate.

MacMillan et al organized it. The iceman and ice houses then went out of use. Newt McCallum used to deliver ice daily in summer. And ice was cut for many years (1930-40 + previous) at head of lake.

P 5. Is there any Cardinal Flower? I tried to grow it on the island but failed several times.

P 5. To identify the Service berry (Shad bush) I looms probably - one of the "loveliest shrubs".

P. 6. The Trout Lake Rod & Gun Club (see Richard Manzolati or Art Tegnor) has since 1935 or so seen to annual stocking of Trout (& Cedar Lake).

P. 6. Geese also go ~~south~~ south in fall. Saw 152 take off last Oct 6 at sunrise.

p 7. What are the "fire falls"? This account hints the great forest fire about 1918, 19, or 20 which swept miles of the cut-over timberland to the west and narrowly missed consuming all camps on the lake. Was stopped by extraordinary effort at Trout Lake road. Mrs Wallace probably can supply some details.

Bronas I. was burned over (after logging) about 1925-30 I understand. One can see there how long it takes the native pines to recover.

Merrils Dam, which created a small lake on the about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile west of the Bancroft cottage on headwaters of Tanner's Creek may deserve mention. I believe at one time this diverted excess water into Trout L. (there is evidence of an old canal in the woods) and the Trout lake level was maintained 3 or 4 ft higher than at present for benefit of sawmills at foot of lake.

Beavers ~~may~~ have occupied Merrils Dam, and other places including Trout L. outlet at various times. In 1940's they dammed the outlet and threatened to drown out many boat-houses. The state finally trapped & removed them.

A control gate to regulate the water level in summer was maintained 1940-60 & may still be in use I believe. There have been some minor problems in satisfying farmers down Tanner Creek who wish the water to be left out in dry spells in summer to supply their cattle - resulting in lowering the lake level uncomfortably for cottagers.
